Mr. Speaker and Members of the House of Delegates: 1 2 3 Reference Committee B considered its agenda of resolutions and reports, and submits 4 the following report: 5 6 1.) RESOLUTION 204 (23) - OPPOSITION TO PROHIBITING PHYSICIANS FROM 7 REFERRING PATIENTS FOR EVIDENCED-BASED HEALTHCARE ACROSS STATE 8 LINES 9 10 **RECOMMENDATION NO. 1:** 11 12 Mr. Speaker, your Reference Committee recommends that Resolution 204 (23) be amended by deletion and insertion so that the lines read: 13 14 RESOLVED, Idaho Medical Association adopts policy supporting a physician's 15 16 fiduciary and ethical responsibility to refer patients across state 17 lines, so long as the care provided is legal, evidence-based 18 medical care within the standard of care in the state to which the 19 patient is being referred. 20 21 RESOLVED. Idaho Medical Association adopts policy supporting a physician's professional decision to offer patients their treatment options to 22 the best of their knowledge and ability, and when indicated based 23 on patient preference, refer patients across state lines, so long as 24 the care provided is legal and within standard of care in the state 25 26 to which the patient is being referred. 27 28 **RECOMMENDATION NO. 2:** 29 30 Mr. Speaker, your Reference Committee recommends that Resolution 204 (23) be 31 adopted as amended. 32 33 RES 204 was introduced in response to a recent legal opinion by Idaho's Attorney General in which a physician's ability to refer a patient to another state for medical 34 care was questioned. 35 36

The Committee heard a wide range of testimony largely supportive of the original intent of the resolution to protect a physician's ability to refer patients across state

lines. However, there was significant debate over the exact wording.

 The Committee received four amendments, all of which removed the "fiduciary and ethical responsibility" language.

One of the four amendments provided a complete rewrite of the resolved clause. With one exception, the Committee recommends adopting the full substitute resolve as it utilized all aspects of the remaining amendments and tied in most aspects of the debate. The exception is the use of the word "obligation". The Committee was concerned about the legal aspect of "obligation" and worried about the unintended liability consequences. Instead, the Committee preferred language provided in another amendment, "decision", and substituted it accordingly.

Therefore, the Committee recommends adoption of Resolution 204 as amended.

2.) RESOLUTION 206 (23) – OPPOSING THE CRIMINALIZATION OF EVIDENCE-BASED MEDICAL CARE

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1:

Mr. Speaker, your Reference Committee recommends that Resolution 206 (23) <u>be</u> <u>amended by deletion and insertion so that the lines read:</u>

Idaho Medical Association remove its policy stating, "IMA does not have a position on whether, to what extent or under what conditions abortion should be legal or illegal and believes that support for or opposition to abortion is a matter for IMA members to decide individually, based on personal values or beliefs. IMA will take no action which may be construed as an attempt to alter or influence the personal views of members regarding abortion. Further, IMA will take no action or position on the merits of abortion itself and will only consider engagement if legislation presents a significant encroachment into the sanctity of the physician-patient relationship and then only when directed by the IMA Board of Trustees. IMA will oppose any efforts to impose criminal penalties on physicians who are providing medical care

IMA does not have a position on whether, to what extent or under what conditions elective/open access abortion should be legal or illegal. IMA respects that individual members have a diverse set of values and beliefs and does not seek to influence member views regarding abortion; and be it further

that is legal at the time of service,"; and be it further

Idaho Medical Association (IMA) will oppose any legislation that criminalizes evidence-based medical care that is determined necessary by the patient's healthcare provider, which includes abortion. IMA recognizes that its members have a range of beliefs and values with regard to abortion and does not seek to alter or

influence personal views. With this statement, we reaffirm our commitment to protecting the physician-patient relationship, and that medical decisions should be made between a patient and their physician without government interference.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2:

Mr. Speaker, your Reference Committee recommends that Resolution 206 (23) <u>be adopted as amended.</u>

RES 206 was the subject of much spirited debate. The majority opposed adopting the resolution as written. Two amendments were offered. The first would delete the first Resolved clause and also would delete the language "which includes abortion" in the second Resolved clause. The second amendment would also delete the first Resolved clause and replace it with a new one clarifying that IMA's position of neutrality on abortion applies only to elective/open access abortion but not to other medically necessary treatments for pregnancy complications.

 The Reference Committee believed that the clear will of the House was that IMA's policy should be clarified to specify that its position of neutrality applies only to abortions sought by patients who no longer wish to be pregnant, and not to abortions to protect the life or health of the mother including mental health, for fetal lethal anomalies, and for rape or incest victims without a police report. The Reference Committee further believed that the clear will of the House is that IMA policy should explicitly oppose the criminalization of evidence-based health care within the standard of care.

The Reference Committee also heard testimony that the title of the resolution refers to "Criminalization or Evidence-Based Medical Care" broadly, not only to abortion. Several members testified that the language in the second resolved "which includes abortion" was inappropriate or unnecessary. The Reference Committee believes that the clarification of IMA policy in the first resolved together with the statement in both resolves that IMA policy should respect the diverse views of its members make the deletion of this phrase, as proposed in both amendments, to be appropriate and in accord with the will of the House.

3.) RESOLUTION 209 (23) – VIRTUAL PARTICIPATION IN THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1:

Mr. Speaker, your Reference Committee recommends that Resolution 209 (23) <u>be amended by insertion so that the lines read:</u>

RESOLVED, Idaho Medical Association expand the format of the House of Delegates to include official participation via virtual and in-person options starting at the 2024 IMA Annual Meeting; and be it further

 RESOLVED, Idaho Medical Association Board of Trustees reserves the right to charge a fee for House of Delegates participation; and be it further

RESOLVED, Only Idaho Medical Association delegates who attend the full House of Delegates meeting virtually or in-person will have full access to voting on reference committee report recommendations and elections.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2:

Mr. Speaker, your Reference Committee recommends that Resolution 209 (23) <u>be adopted as amended.</u>

RES 209 changes the way the House of Delegates will be conducted in future years, directing IMA staff to create a hybrid attendance option allowing delegates to participate in person, virtually, or a combination of both.

The Committee received testimony in unanimous support for RES 209 that suggested with consistent virtual and hybrid options available, attendance for the HOD will continue to grow stronger. The attendance of many IMA members, and potential delegates, is prohibited based on financial and time constraints.

There were two amendments received, both of which the Committee recommends adopting. The first amendment inserted the word "only" into the original second resolved clause. The Committee adopted this change as there was no testimony in opposition and it ultimately strengthened the attendance policy and preserved the integrity of voting.

The second amendment was introduced by a member of the IMA Board of Trustees that specifically addresses the Board's fiduciary responsibility. It was argued that as the HOD advances to a virtual option, one unintended consequence may be less vendor support. IMA does not charge a registration fee for HOD attendance, and one method used to offset that cost is vendor participation. A financial reduction due to the impact of vendor participation may require a registration fee to offset. There are also potential staffing concerns that could come up as it is significantly more burdensome to pull off a hybrid event. The Committee did not receive testimony in opposition to the amendment and recognizing the possibility of those unintended consequences, recommends adopting the amendment.

Finally, the Committee agreed that, based on its recommendation for RES 208, that RES 209 should be presented first.

Therefore, the Committee recommends Resolution 209 be adopted as amended.

4.) RESOLUTION 208 (23) – REQUIRE FRIDAY HOUSE OF DELEGATES ATTENDANCE FOR SUNDAY VOTING

RECOMMENDATION:

Mr. Speaker, your Reference Committee recommends that Resolution 208 (23) <u>be adopted as originally written.</u>

RESOLVED,

Idaho Medical Association Bylaws be amended by inclusion of the following provision:

Chapter IV House of Delegates, Section 3. Quorum and Voting: A majority of the delegates registered to attend a House of Delegates meeting as of the start of the first session of the House shall constitute a quorum. Only those delegates (and alternate delegates entitled to vote under these Bylaws) whose credentials have been confirmed by the Committee on Credentials and who have attended all or a majority of the first session of the House (as confirmed by the Committee on Credentials) shall be counted for the determination of a quorum and allowed to vote in an election or any other matter before the House during the first or a subsequent session under these Bylaws.

RES 208 changes the IMA Bylaws to require full HOD attendance in order to have voting privileges on Sunday.

Initially, the Committee heard testimony largely in opposition to this amendment, most of which was based on testimony by delegates regarding the difficulty of attending the meeting in its entirety. However, a member of the Board of Trustees testified to the original intent of the resolution which was to act as companion in a move to virtual or hybrid HOD options. When explained, the Committee heard testimony in support of RES 208. This included remarks that attendance by delegates on Sunday only has created significant confusion in previous years.

The Committee agreed with the testimony that RES 208 should have been presented following RES 209 and had concerns that the HOD would prefer addressing the Committee's recommendation for RES 209 before addressing RES 208.

Therefore, the Committee recommends Resolution 208 be adopted as originally written.
