Report of REFERENCE COMMITTEE B

1 Mr. Speaker and Members of the House of Delegates:

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3 Reference Committee B considered its agenda of resolutions and reports, and submits
4 the following report:

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6 1.) RESOLUTION 204 (23) – OPPOSITION TO PROHIBITING PHYSICIANS FROM
7 REFERRING PATIENTS FOR EVIDENCED-BASED HEALTHCARE ACROSS STATE
8 LINES

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10 RECOMMENDATION NO. 1:

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12 Mr. Speaker, your Reference Committee recommends that Resolution 204 (23) be
13 amended by deletion and insertion so that the lines read:

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15 ~~RESOLVED, Idaho Medical Association adopts policy supporting a physician's~~
16 ~~fiduciary and ethical responsibility to refer patients across state~~
17 ~~lines, so long as the care provided is legal, evidence based~~
18 ~~medical care within the standard of care in the state to which the~~
19 ~~patient is being referred.~~

21 RESOLVED, Idaho Medical Association adopts policy supporting a physician's
22 professional decision to offer patients their treatment options to
23 the best of their knowledge and ability, and when clinically
24 indicated and desired by the patient, refer patients across state
25 lines, so long as the care provided is legal and within standard of
26 care in the state to which the patient is being referred.

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28 RECOMMENDATION NO. 2:

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30 Mr. Speaker, your Reference Committee recommends that Resolution 204 (23) be
31 adopted as amended.

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33 RES 204 was introduced in response to a recent legal opinion by Idaho's Attorney
34 General in which a physician's ability to refer a patient to another state for medical
35 care was questioned.

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37 The Committee heard a wide range of testimony largely supportive of the original
38 intent of the resolution to protect a physician's ability to refer patients across state
39 lines. However, there was significant debate over the exact wording.

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2 The Committee received four amendments, all of which removed the “fiduciary and
3 ethical responsibility” language.
4

5 One of the four amendments provided a complete rewrite of the resolved clause. With
6 one exception, the Committee recommends adopting the full substitute resolve as it
7 utilized all aspects of the remaining amendments and tied in most aspects of the
8 debate. The exception is the use of the word “obligation”. The Committee was
9 concerned about the legal aspect of “obligation” and worried about the unintended
10 liability consequences. Instead, the Committee preferred language provided in another
11 amendment, “decision”, and substituted it accordingly.
12

13 Therefore, the Committee recommends adoption of Resolution 204 as amended.
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15 2.) RESOLUTION 206 (23) – OPPOSING THE CRIMINALIZATION OF EVIDENCE-
16 BASED MEDICAL CARE
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18 RECOMMENDATION NO. 1:
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20 Mr. Speaker, your Reference Committee recommends that Resolution 206 (23) be
21 amended by deletion and insertion so that the lines read:
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23 RESOLVED, Idaho Medical Association (IMA) will oppose any legislation that
24 criminalizes evidence-based medical care that is determined
25 necessary by the patient’s healthcare provider, ~~which includes~~
26 ~~abortion. IMA recognizes that its members have a range of beliefs~~
27 ~~and values with regard to abortion and does not seek to alter or~~
28 ~~influence personal views.~~ With this statement, we reaffirm our
29 commitment to protecting the physician-patient relationship, and
30 that medical decisions should be made between a patient and
31 their physician without government interference.
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33 RESOLVED, Idaho Medical Association will not have an official position on
34 abortion and believes it is up to individual members to decide their
35 position on abortion.
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37 RECOMMENDATION NO. 2:
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39 Mr. Speaker, your Reference Committee recommends that Resolution 206 (23) be
40 adopted as amended.
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42 RES 206 was the subject of much spirited debate. The majority opposed adopting the
43 resolution as written. Two amendments were offered. The first would delete the first
44 Resolved clause and also would delete the language “which includes abortion” in the
45 second Resolved clause. The second amendment would also delete the first Resolved
46 clause and replace it with a new one clarifying that IMA’s position of neutrality on
47 abortion applies only to elective/open access abortion but not to other medically
48 necessary treatments for pregnancy complications.

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2 The Reference Committee believed that the clear will of the House was that IMA’s
3 policy should be clarified to specify that its position of neutrality applies only to
4 abortions sought by patients who no longer wish to be pregnant, and not to abortions
5 to protect the life or health of the mother including mental health, for fetal lethal
6 anomalies, and for rape or incest victims without a police report. The Reference
7 Committee further believed that the clear will of the House is that IMA policy should
8 explicitly oppose the criminalization of evidence-based health care within the standard
9 of care.

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11 The Reference Committee also heard testimony that the title of the resolution refers to
12 “Criminalization or Evidence-Based Medical Care” broadly, not only to abortion.
13 Several members testified that the language in the second resolved “which includes
14 abortion” was inappropriate or unnecessary. The Reference Committee believes that
15 the clarification of IMA policy in the first resolved together with the statement in both
16 resolves that IMA policy should respect the diverse views of its members make the
17 deletion of this phrase, as proposed in both amendments, to be appropriate and in
18 accord with the will of the House.

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20 3.) RESOLUTION 209 (23) – VIRTUAL PARTICIPATION IN THE HOUSE OF
21 DELEGATES

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23 RECOMMENDATION NO. 1:

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25 Mr. Speaker, your Reference Committee recommends that Resolution 209 (23) be
26 amended by insertion so that the lines read:

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28 RESOLVED, Idaho Medical Association expand the format of the House of
29 Delegates to include official participation via virtual and in-person
30 options starting at the 2024 IMA Annual Meeting; and be it further
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32 RESOLVED, Idaho Medical Association Board of Trustees reserves the right to
33 charge a fee for House of Delegates participation; and be it further
34

35 RESOLVED, Idaho Medical Association delegates who attend the House of
36 Delegates meeting virtually or in-person will have full access to
37 voting on reference committee report recommendations and
38 elections.
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40 RECOMMENDATION NO. 2:

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42 Mr. Speaker, your Reference Committee recommends that Resolution 209 (23) be
43 adopted as amended.
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45 RES 209 changes the way the House of Delegates will be conducted in future years,
46 directing IMA staff to create a hybrid attendance option allowing delegates to
47 participate in person, virtually, or a combination of both.
48

1 The Committee received testimony in unanimous support for RES 209 that suggested
2 with consistent virtual and hybrid options available, attendance for the HOD will
3 continue to grow stronger. The attendance of many IMA members, and potential
4 delegates, is prohibited based on financial and time constraints.

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6 There were two amendments received, both of which the Committee recommends
7 adopting. The first amendment inserted the word “only” into the original second
8 resolved clause. The Committee adopted this change as there was no testimony in
9 opposition and it ultimately strengthened the attendance policy and preserved the
10 integrity of voting.

11
12 The second amendment was introduced by a member of the IMA Board of Trustees
13 that specifically addresses the Board’s fiduciary responsibility. It was argued that as
14 the HOD advances to a virtual option, one unintended consequence may be less
15 vendor support. IMA does not charge a registration fee for HOD attendance, and one
16 method used to offset that cost is vendor participation. A financial reduction due to the
17 impact of vendor participation may require a registration fee to offset. There are also
18 potential staffing concerns that could come up as it is significantly more burdensome
19 to pull off a hybrid event. The Committee did not receive testimony in opposition to the
20 amendment and recognizing the possibility of those unintended consequences,
21 recommends adopting the amendment.

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23 Finally, the Committee agreed that, based on its recommendation for RES 208, that
24 RES 209 should be presented first.

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26 Therefore, the Committee recommends Resolution 209 be adopted as amended.

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28 4.) RESOLUTION 208 (23) – REQUIRE FRIDAY HOUSE OF DELEGATES
29 ATTENDANCE FOR SUNDAY VOTING

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31 RECOMMENDATION:

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33 Mr. Speaker, your Reference Committee recommends that Resolution 208 (23) be
34 adopted as originally written.

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36 RESOLVED, Idaho Medical Association Bylaws be amended by inclusion of the
37 following provision:

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39 Chapter IV House of Delegates, Section 3. Quorum and Voting: A
40 majority of the delegates registered to attend a House of
41 Delegates meeting as of the start of the first session of the House
42 shall constitute a quorum. Only those delegates (and alternate
43 delegates entitled to vote under these Bylaws) whose credentials
44 have been confirmed by the Committee on Credentials and who
45 have attended all or a majority of the first session of the House (as
46 confirmed by the Committee on Credentials) shall be counted for
47 the determination of a quorum and allowed to vote in an election

1 or any other matter before the House during the first or a
2 subsequent session under these Bylaws.

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4 RES 208 changes the IMA Bylaws to require full HOD attendance in order to have
5 voting privileges on Sunday.

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7 Initially, the Committee heard testimony largely in opposition to this amendment, most
8 of which was based on testimony by delegates regarding the difficulty of attending the
9 meeting in its entirety. However, a member of the Board of Trustees testified to the
10 original intent of the resolution which was to act as companion in a move to virtual or
11 hybrid HOD options. When explained, the Committee heard testimony in support of
12 RES 208. This included remarks that attendance by delegates on Sunday only has
13 created significant confusion in previous years.

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15 The Committee agreed with the testimony that RES 208 should have been presented
16 following RES 209 and had concerns that the HOD would prefer addressing the
17 Committee's recommendation for RES 209 before addressing RES 208.

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19 Therefore, the Committee recommends Resolution 208 be adopted as originally
20 written.
